

















Newtown Primary School

These are the 50 books we think Newtown Primary School children, in Year 6, will love.




We ask that you choose the books with your children. The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas covers some sensitive issues surrounding WW2. Miss Peregrine's Home for Peculiar children is a challenging text. A Monster Calls is emotionally fraught and heavy going. The Hunger Games is a more mature series of novels. The Hobbit is a challenging text.
